

Death of Mrs. George Davis.

Ellen Fulkerson Davis was born in Ada, Yates county, New York, 1835. In 1869 she married Mr. George Davis, of Boise City, Idaho. Together they made a beautiful home in the valley, about two miles from Boise. Mrs. Davis was a most estimable wife, a kind neighbor and a true friend. Her willing hands and quick sympathy are missed by many. Her pride in her home was commendable. The industry of her hands was everywhere visible in the tasty adornments and neat arrangement of her house. Her hospitality was unbounded; she was always happy in seeing and entertaining her friends. She united with the Presbyterian church of Boise, Feb. 24, 1878, and from that time until her death she was an active worker in the church she dearly loved. It was her custom, when able, to attend divine service both morning and evening, and until prostrated by disease her seat in the sanctuary was seldom vacant. Although her last days were overshadowed by the most intense suffering she remained true to her Christian vows in her strong desire and zeal to do something more for the church of God. For about two years before her death she was a sufferer from a cruel disease which never lessened its hold until her life was taken. In the spring of 1896 she heroically underwent the most severe treatment from which her constitution already weakened never rallied. She lingered in suffering until Oct. 20, 1896, when her home and her husband were left, for the rest of her father's house above. Her remains are laid in the Masonic cemetery of Boise City, Idaho.
